Volunteer Training Scheme 2006 "SamariLeaders of Tomorrow"



The Volunteer Training Scheme 2006 – "SamariLeaders of Tomorrow" was held from February to April this year. 80 Form 2 and Form 3 students from _____ local schools in Hong Kong participated in this meaningful project, and together with 30 enthusiastic organizing committee members, we created lasting memories.

The annual Volunteer Training Scheme aims to provide participants with the opportunity to serve our society through volunteer training. This year, instead of focusing chiefly on developing skills related to social services, we decided to include leadership training skills, which we believe to be extremely important both personal success and for for contribution to society.

SamariLeaders of Tomorrow

The theme of our project, "SamariLeaders of Tomorrow", contains two key aspects. "Samari" is a reference to the story of a Good Samaritan in the bible. In the story, the Good Samaritan shows his unconditional and selfless love towards those in need. We hope to be able to encourage participants to actively serve society, and foster a lifelong passion for doing so. We hope that through this project participants will gain a broadened perspective of how they can make a difference to the community. In the project, participants will take а microscopic view in providing service. There will be four key areas of service: the elderly, orphans, the deaf and the blind. For each of these fields we will be working closely with a supporting nongovernmental organization (see below) that is at the forefront of the service topic. These four fields have been selected to provide participants with a novel learning experience.

The second aspect of the project is to allow participants to recognize their roles as future leaders of society. We hope to equip them with the skills that they will need to fulfill this responsibility. particular, the In Volunteer Training Scheme 2006 seeks to convey to participants the idea of "communication" as a fundamental part of leadership. We hope to teach participants the need to communicate

both macroscopically, through interpersonal skills such as public speaking to inspire others, and microscopically, through building a strong relationship with peers.

A Brief Overview of the Project

Orientation Day

The Orientation Day was held on 18th February 2006 at Maryknoll Convent School. We were honored to have Mr. Choi Chung Fai, a distinguished social worker in the field, as our quest speaker. Our participants warmed up to each other after some ice-breaking games, demonstrated their creativity through forming group names and and slogans, prepared for the adventure-based training to be held the following day.

Adventure Day

All of us arrived bright and early at No. 4 Outlying Pier in Central on 19th February. Although it was raining, the weather did not dampen our spirits. As it turned out, the sky cleared soon after we arrived at the Lamma Island Campsite, and participants enjoyed an unforgettable day where they tested their physical and emotional limits, stepped out of their comfort zones, and developed leadership skills. Most important of all, group members bonded closely with each other. We all left the camp exhausted, but in extremely good spirits.

Leadership Day

The Leadership Day was held at Diocesan Boys' School on 26th February. Our SamariLeaders listened to a keynote Address on "Communication" by Ms. Audrey Yu, who was also kind to answer the many questions raised. The other quest speaker was Mr. Sung Lap Yeung, who gave an interactive workshop on public speaking. The participants also enjoyed a few inspiring leadership training games hosted by our Organizing Committee members, and a debate, with our advisors Carol Cheung, William Chan, Eva Yu and Sylvia Yu as adjudicators. They also shared with us their experiences as student leaders.



Volunteer Day

The Volunteer Day was also held at Diocesan Boys' School on 4th March. Groups again challenged each other in games that required good teamwork, cooperation and coordination. Then came the highlight of the day: the drama competition, with our advisors Donald Sham, Winnie Sze and Kiyan Tam as adjudicators. We enjoyed ten consecutive highly entertaining, thrilling and creative performances!





Pledge Ceremony

After a period of individual planning of their social service projects, the groups came together again on 18th March to officially pledge their commitment to their service projects. We were honored to have Ms. Linda Lai, JP, to officiate the pledging ceremony. With the guidance of executive committee members and organizing committee members, the groups then proceeded to execute their carefully planned service projects. Each group organized one service day, and participated in another. Service centers ranged from the elderly to child-care centers.

Closing Ceremony

The 9th April was the last official day of the whole Scheme. We were extremely

honored to have Mr. Paul Tang, JP, to officiate Closing Ceremony. the Participants met again in Diocesan Boys School, and presented their reports on their service projects. A video slideshow followed presentations, and the participants were awarded their certificates. Finally, a Best Volunteer and Best Leader were voted out of each group by their group members.

Hong Kong Youth Summit 2006



The 4th annual Hong Kong Youth Summit 2006 was held between the 1st April and the 22nd April 2006. Involving 120 students from local and international schools in Hong Kong, Leadership with 12 Groups, 6 Commissions and 5 days of engaging discussion and debate, the Hong Kong Youth Summit 2006 has truly been a memorable highlight in our Association's calendar this year.

The Hong Kong Youth Summit aims to allow secondary school students to raise awareness of, and exchange thoughts and views on, issues of current economic and political significance, as well as encourage students to voice their opinions and engage in debate. In this year's Summit, Students emulated legislators representing different sectors and discussed different issues that were of significant social importance. Through a series of leadership group and commission meetings, discussion and debate, interactive and informative speeches, seminars by eminent members of the Hong Kong Government and experts in

the field, interviews, surveys and field visits to the concerned sector of people in Hong Kong, students were inspired to think critically in different perspectives and put forward solutions to current problems in Hong Kong that will help shape its future. The Hong Kong Youth Summit 2006 culminated in a spectacular Final Summit and Banquet, where resolutions were further debated and voted on.

This year, the Youth Summit focused on the all-important future of Hong Kong included such pressing and vet controversial issues such as the environment, education and healthcare reform, tourism, social welfare and Hong Kong's position of economic importance in relation to the world. Due to keen competition abroad, participating students recognized the urgent need for Hong Kong to make the best use of her assets in order to remain competitive as well as the significant impact that the issues involved would have on Hong Kong's future.

The final resolutions produced will be sent to the press, the Legislative Council and respective government bureaux or departments, such as the Health, Welfare and Food Bureau, Home Affairs Bureau, Education and Manpower Bureau, Environment, Transport and Works Bureau in order to reflect the views of Hong Kong youths.



What was new to HKYS?

As with all previous Youth Summits, this year's Hong Kong Youth Summit 2006 was not short of exciting debates and commission and leadership group meetings. However, a few novel elements were added to further enhance the insurmountable YS Experience.

"On the Brink of Disaster"

"On the Brink of Disaster" was an original and specially-designed crisis to challenge participating students to explore different and creative ideas to solve the challenges posed to them. The 1st of its kind, the crisis, named the Ma Chau Island-EINNA Crisis, brought all sectors of society together in a controversial stand-off between local villagers, environmentalists, artists, members of the healthcare and education sectors, and businessmen, both foreign and local, workers and the media. In addition, the Crisis was supplemented by two interactive news videos that illustrated the entire situation prior to the participants being informed of the crisis.

The Ma Chau Island-EINNA Crisis surrounded the plight of the villagers of Ma Chau Island, an island south of Lantau Island with a special large-sized plateau, whose lifestyles were disrupted significantly by the construction of an important media and communications centre by American media firm EINNA, which cited the plateau's height and size as unique and ideal for the centre, which would in turn bring great economic benefits to Hong Kong. The project, however, was marred by controversial government intervention, environmentally debilitating techniques and the discovery of an important ageold monument underneath the plateau, which would have to be destroyed, if the centre were to be built. With protests numbering some 40,000 people, contentious counter-proposals by the government and EINNA and violent scuffles, the participants were challenged to find a solution that would appease all and solve the crisis.



Commission Introductions & Seminars

In order to enhance the participants' knowledge of each commission prior to their decision on which commission to attend and to facilitate better debate in the final Summit, a series of Commission Introductions, presentations bv Commission Leaders and Commission Seminars, Seminars by famous experts in each field, were held. These proved highly interactive and informing and helped the participants in acquiring an all-rounded knowledge of all

commissions, rather than just their own. Notable seminars included those by The Hon. Prof. CHEUNG Bing-leung, BBS, JP, Executive Councilor, Mrs. Fanny LAW Fan Chiu-fun, JP, Permanent Secretary for Education and Manpower and Dr. CHU Kin-wah, Vice President of the Hong Kong Medical Association.

System

A slight change in the system of the Summit helped to encourage participants to follow their respective leadership group viewpoints better and to facilitate more informed debate and discussion. Each Commission was no longer obliged to present a resolution to the final Summit that was agreed upon by all Leadership Group representatives from that Commission. Rather, a vote took place within the Commission itself to pick a resolution that would be presented while the failed resolutions could then be presented as amendments in the final Summit, if the submitting Leadership Group wished to do so. Moreover, a veto power was introduced to allow each Leadership Group to voice strong objection.

Leadership Group Expert Interviews

Aimed at providing each leadership group with a better understanding of their views, these interviews were held with eminent members of each sector in the Hong Kong Youth Summit. The Interviews were held in the days between Day 1 and Day 2 and 3 of the Summit and were particularly helpful in allowing students to properly assimilate Notable interviewees their roles. included Mr. CHENG Yiu-tung, Chairman of the Hong Kong Federation of Trade Unions and Executive Councilor, Mr. Stephen MARCOPOTO, Chairman of the American Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Andrew WONG Ho-yuen, JP, Permanent Secretary for the Civil Service and Ms. Linda HO, Chief Executive of the Hong Kong Green Council.

The Hong Kong Youth Summit 2006: A Short Overview

With an opening address by Prof. TSUI Lap-chee, the Hong Kong Youth Summit 2006 opened on Saturday 1st April with the Orientation Day, where students were introduced to the various systems involved in the Summit and the parts they were to play, whilst simultaneously



given a chance to get to know other students through thought-provoking and exciting games.

This was followed by Day 1 held on the Sunday thereafter, when the Hong Kong Youth Summit 2006 officially commenced. Participants were briefed on the overall topic with an informative address by The Hon. Prof. CHEUNG Bing-leung, BBS, JP and then introduced to each commission by Commission Leaders and to their respective leadership groups by Faculty Advisors. Subsequently, students began Leadership Group Meetings and Commission Meetings as well as hearing two interactive Commission Seminars on Environment and Commerce.

A week later, after a number of Interviews with experts during the week, the Summit reconvened on Saturday 8th April. Apart from participating Leadership Group Meetings, Commission Meetings and three seminars on Social Welfare, Education and Tourism, the students participated in an interactive Mass Game that further strengthened their friendships.

The remaining interviews were held in the week thereafter, with Day 3 taking place on Saturday 15th April. The students were briefed, through two video newsflashes and an information pack, of the impending "On the Brink of Disaster" and were given time to participate in a Disaster Forum and Alignment Building Session to form allies and a direction for a resolution on the crisis. Furthermore, Ms. Emily MOK Fung-yee, JP, inspired the students by giving them an interactive seminar on Public Speaking and Communication.



Finally, the final Hong Kong Youth Summit 2006 culminated spectacularly on the 22nd April 2006. Heated debate took place on the resolutions presented by each commission with amendments providing an interesting twist to each resolution. The presentations of solutions to the Ma Chau Island-EINNA Crisis took place simultaneously, with three different alignments proposing three creative and varying solutions. A touching closing address by Mr. Joseph LEE Chung-tak, BBS, JP, photo-taking and presentation of certificates ended the passionate debate that characterized the official Summit. However, an optional Closing Banguet held on location at the University of Hong Kong, closed the Summit on a more sentimental note.

The 19th Executive Committee would also like to thank Wofoo Social Enterprises, the University of Hong Kong and Mr. George LUNG Chee-ming, MH, without whose generous contributions, the Hong Kong Youth Summit 2006 would not be possible.

It is our sincere hope that the Hong Kong Youth Summit 2006 has broadened the horizons of participants and encouraged them to speak out.
